

1982 No. 1189**CUSTOMS AND EXCISE****The Customs Duties (Quota Relief) (Paper, Paperboard and Printed Products) (Amendment) Order 1982**

Made - - - - - 19th August 1982

Laid before the House of Commons 20th August 1982

Coming into Operation 10th September 1982

The Secretary of State, in exercise of the powers conferred on him by section 1 of the Customs and Excise Duties (General Reliefs) Act 1979^(a) and of all other powers enabling him in that behalf, hereby makes the following Order:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Customs Duties (Quota Relief) (Paper, Paperboard and Printed Products) (Amendment) Order 1982 and shall come into operation on 10th September 1982.

2. In the Customs Duties (Quota Relief) (Paper, Paperboard and Printed Products) Order 1981^(b) in the entry in column 3 of Schedule 6 relating to subheading ex 48.07 D of the common customs tariff of the European Economic Community, in respect of coated printing paper, weighing less than 225 g/m², for “22,578 tonnes” there shall be substituted “30,149 tonnes” and for “12,538 tonnes” there shall be substituted “20,109 tonnes”.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Note is not part of the Order.)

This Order, which comes into operation on 10th September 1982, amends the Customs Duties (Quota Relief) (Paper, Paperboard and Printed Products) Order 1981 by increasing the duty-free tariff quota which the United Kingdom is entitled to open under Protocol No. 1 to the Agreement between the European Economic Community and Finland (OJ No. L328, 28.11.1973, p. 2) for coated mechanical printing paper weighing not more than 65 g/m² falling within subheading 48.07 D of the common customs tariff of the European Economic Community and originating in Finland from 12,538 tonnes to 20,109 tonnes. The duty-free tariff quota for all coated printing paper, weighing less than 225 g/m² falling within subheading 48.07 D is accordingly increased from 22,578 tonnes to 30,149 tonnes. This is in accordance with an agreement in the form of a recent exchange of letters approved by Council Regulation (EEC) No. 2205 (OJ No L235) amending the quota which the United Kingdom is entitled to open for 1982 under the terms of Protocol No. 1.
