

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM TO
THE PNEUMOCONIOSIS ETC. (WORKERS' COMPENSATION) (PAYMENT OF
CLAIMS) (AMENDMENT) REGULATIONS 2021

2021 No. 271

1. Introduction

1.1 This explanatory memorandum has been prepared by the Department for Work and Pensions and is laid before Parliament by Command of Her Majesty.

2. Purpose of the instrument

2.1 The Pneumoconiosis etc. (Workers' Compensation) Act 1979¹ ("the 1979 Act") makes provision for lump sum compensation payments to be made to people suffering from specified dust-related diseases, or their dependants, provided they meet the conditions of entitlement.

2.2 The compensation payments are set according to the age of disease sufferers and the extent of their disability and whether or not they were, or would have been, entitled to Industrial Injuries Disablement Benefit. This instrument increases the amount of compensation paid to disease sufferers, or their dependants under the 1979 Act scheme by 0.5%.

5. European Convention on Human Rights

5.1 The Minister for Disabled People, Health and Work, Justin Tomlinson, has made the following statement regarding Human Rights:

"In my view the provisions of the Pneumoconiosis etc. (Workers' Compensation) (Payment of Claims) (Amendment) Regulations 2021 are compatible with the Convention rights."

6. Legislative Context

- 6.1 The 1979 Act does not require that the rates of compensation payments be increased. However, the Government has reviewed the rates in order to maintain their value in line with inflation. This instrument increases the current rates of payment of the Pneumoconiosis etc. (Workers' Compensation) (Payments of Claims) Regulations 1988 ("the 1988 Regulations")², by 0.5%. The rates of payment set out in the 1988 Regulations were last updated on 1 April 2020.

7. Policy background

What is being done and why?

- 7.1 The 1979 Act provides lump sum compensation payments to sufferers of certain dust-related diseases. It also makes provision for payments to dependants, as defined by the 1979 Act, where the disease sufferer did not claim a compensation payment under the 1979 Act before their death.
- 7.2 Although there is no statutory obligation to increase payments in line with inflation under the 1979 Act, the Government has decided to increase the amounts paid as set out in the Pneumoconiosis etc. (Workers' Compensation) (Payment of Claims) Regulations 1988 by 0.5% - the rate of inflation as measured by the September 2020 Consumer Prices Index. As payments made under this scheme are in respect of people who have been disabled through contracting certain dust-related diseases through work, they are being up-rated in line with other disability benefits.

8. European Union (Withdrawal) Act/Withdrawal of the United Kingdom from the European Union

- 8.1 This instrument does not relate to withdrawal from the European Union / trigger the statement requirements under the European Union (Withdrawal) Act.

9. Consolidation

- 9.1 Consolidation is not necessary because this instrument is an up-rating instrument.

10. Consultation outcome

- 10.1 There is no duty to consult over these increases and a consultation has not been carried out. These increases are at the rate of inflation as measured by the September 2020 Consumer Prices Index, and are in line with the uprating of Industrial Injuries benefits and other social security disability benefits (such as Carers' Allowance and Personal Independence Payment) which are increased under other statutory provisions.

11. Guidance

- 11.1 Prior to implementation a guidance bulletin detailing the new rates will be issued to claim processors in the DWP Barrow office with the responsibility for processing all claims under the 1979 Act.

12. Impact

- 12.1 There is no, or no significant, impact on business, charities or voluntary bodies.

- 12.2 There is no, or no significant, impact on the public sector.
- 12.3 An Impact Assessment has not been prepared for this instrument because the impact on the public sector is negligible. There will be an estimated £218 thousand increase to the DWP Departmental Expenditure Limit for 21/22. These estimates are at the time of the submission but delayed assessments due to Covid-19 may impact on final costings.

13. Regulating small business

- 13.1 The legislation does not apply to activities that are undertaken by small businesses.

14. Monitoring & review

- 14.1 The changes in the payable rates aim to maintain the value of payments in line with the rate of inflation. The approach to monitoring of this legislation is to review the rates each year.
