

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM TO
THE MESOTHELIOMA LUMP SUM PAYMENTS (CONDITIONS AND AMOUNTS)
(AMENDMENT) REGULATIONS 2023

2023 No. 373

1. Introduction

- 1.1 This explanatory memorandum has been prepared by the Department for Work and Pensions and is laid before Parliament by Command of His Majesty.

2. Purpose of the instrument

- 2.1 The Child Maintenance and Other Payments Act 2008¹ (“the 2008 Act”) makes provision for lump sum compensation payments to be made to people suffering from Diffuse Mesothelioma, or their dependants, who meet the conditions of entitlement. One of the conditions of entitlement is that the disease sufferer has not received certain payments specified in Section 47 of the 2008 Act.
- 2.2 This instrument increases the amounts of compensation paid to sufferers, or their dependants, by 10.1%.

4. Extent and Territorial Application

- 4.1 The territorial extent of this instrument (that is, the jurisdiction(s) which the instrument forms part of the law of) is Great Britain.
- 4.2 The territorial application of this instrument (that is, where the instrument produces a practical effect) is Great Britain.
- 4.3 The Department for Communities in Northern Ireland will be making corresponding provisions for Northern Ireland.

5. European Convention on Human Rights

- 5.1 The Minister for Disabled People, Health and Work, Tom Pursglove MP, has made the following statement regarding Human Rights:

“In my view the provisions of the Mesothelioma Lump Sum Payments (Conditions and Amounts) (Amendment) Regulations 2023 are compatible with the Convention rights.”

6. Legislative Context

- 6.1 The 2008 Act does not require that the rates of compensation be increased. However, the Government has reviewed the rates and decided to uprate the value of payments to maintain their value in line with inflation and maintain parity across the benefits

system. This instrument increases the current rates of payments set out in the Mesothelioma Lump Sum Payments (Conditions and Amounts) Regulations 2008² (“the 2008 Regulations”) by 10.1%.

- 6.2 The rates of payment set out in the 2008 Regulations were last updated on 1 April 2022.

7. Policy background

What is being done and why?

- 7.1 The 2008 Act enables a lump sum to be paid to people with Diffuse Mesothelioma. It also makes provision for payments to dependants, where the disease sufferer did not claim a compensation payment before their death. For the purpose of the 2008 Act, “dependant” has a specific meaning set out in section 3 of the Pneumoconiosis etc. (Workers' Compensation) Act 1979³.
- 7.2 Compensation payments are set according to the age of the disease sufferers.
- 7.3 Although there is no obligation under the legislation to increase the level of payments, the Government has decided to increase the amounts set out in the Mesothelioma Lump Sum Payments (Conditions and Amounts) Regulations 2008 by 10.1% - the rate of inflation as measured by the September 2022 Consumer Prices Index. This increase is in line with the uprating of Industrial Injuries benefits and other social security disability benefits (such as Carers' Allowance and Personal Independence Payment) which are increased under other statutory provisions.

8. European Union Withdrawal and Future Relationship

- 8.1 This instrument does not relate to withdrawal from the European Union / trigger the statement requirements under the European Union (Withdrawal) Act.

9. Consolidation

- 9.1 Consolidation is not necessary because this instrument is an uprating instrument.

10. Consultation outcome

- 10.1 There is no duty to consult over these increases and a consultation has not been carried out.

11. Guidance

- 11.1 Prior to implementation a guidance bulletin detailing the new rates will be issued to the claim processors responsible for processing claims under the 2008 Act and the new figures will be published on GOV.UK.

12. Impact

- 12.1 There is no significant, impact on business, charities, or voluntary bodies.
- 12.2 There is no significant, impact on the public sector.

- 12.3 An Impact Assessment has not been prepared for this instrument because the impact on the public sector is negligible. There will be an estimated £0.82 million increase to the DWP Departmental Expenditure Limit for 23/24.

13. Regulating small business

- 13.1 The legislation does not apply to activities that are undertaken by small businesses.

14. Monitoring & review

- 14.1 The changes in the payable rates aim to maintain the value of payments in line with the rate of inflation. The approach to monitoring of this legislation is to review the rates each year.
