(7) Commutation of War Pensions

The Commutation (Ministry of Pensions) Regulations, 1924, dated July 23, 1924, made by the Minister of Pensions, with the approval of the Treasury, under section 7 of the War Pensions Act, 1921 (11 & 12 Geo. 5. c. 49), providing for the Commutation of Pensions awarded in respect of disablement under Warrants, Orders in Council and Orders administered by the Minister of Pensions.

The Minister of Pensions, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon him by Section 7 of the War Pensions Act, 1921, and with the approval of the Treasury, hereby makes the following Regulations.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Commutation (Ministry of Pensions) Regulations, 1924.

- These Regulations shall apply to pensions (other than the pensions of commissioned officers in the Royal Navy, Royal Marines, Army, and Royal Air Force, and of subordinate and warrant officers in the Royal Navy, and of warrant officers, Class I, in the Royal Marines) awarded in respect of disablement under Warrants, Orders in Council and Orders administered by the Minister of Pensions (hereinafter referred to as the Minister).

- 3. A pension granted under the Order in Council made the 11th day of June, 1920,(a) under the Injuries in War (Compensation) Acts, 1914, to a pensioner of a rank corresponding with that of a commissioned, subordinate or warrant officer of the Royal Navy may be commuted by the Minister on the same terms and conditions as are applicable to officers permitted to commute under the provisions of the Pensions Commutation 34 & 35 Vict. Acts, 1871 and 1882 (or as nearly as may be practicable), and payment of any amount awarded as commutation money shall be payable out of the 45 & 46 Vict. funds of the Ministry of Pensions.

- 4. The pension of a nurse, or sister, or of the widow, child or dependant of an officer or man shall not be commuted.
 - The pension (other than the alternative pension) of:—

(a) a petty officer and a seaman in the Royal Navy;

- (b) an officer below the rank of warrant officer, Class I, and a man, in the Marines;
- (c) an officer below the rank of commissioned officer, and a man in the Army;
- (d) an officer below the rank of commissioned officer, and an airman, in the Royal Air Force; and
- (e) a pensioner under the said Order in Council dated the 11th June, 1920, of a rating corresponding with that of a petty officer or a seaman in the Royal Navy;

may, in the discretion of the Minister, be commuted, provided that:—

- (1) the pensioner is under 80 years;
- (2) the pension is permanent;
- (3) where the pension is at Great War pension rates, only that portion in excess of 14s. a week (or 21s. a week in the case of a warrant officer, 1st class of the Army, or an officer of corresponding rank in the Royal Air Force), or part thereof, may be commuted;
- (4) where the pension is at pre-war pension rates, only that portion in excess of 7s. a week (or 14s. in the case of a warrant officer, 1st class of the Army or an officer of corresponding rank in the Royal Air Force), or part thereof, may be commuted;
- (5) the pensioner proves to the satisfaction of the Minister, not only that it will be to his distinct and permanent advantage to receive a capital sum in lieu of a portion of his pension, but that grave hardship would result if commutation were refused;
- (6) the pensioner passes a medical examination prescribed by the Minister, showing him to be in a good state of health and to possess a normal expectation of life;

- (7) if the pensioner is in receipt of a service pension in addition to a disablement pension, commutation of the disablement pension shall not be allowed so long as any part of the service pension remains commutable under the Regulations governing commutation of service pensions, but, for the purpose of commutation of the disablement pension, any uncommuted portion of the service pension shall be reckoned towards the limits in (3) and (4) above;
- (8) the age of the pensioner shall be reckoned at the age he attained on the birthday immediately preceding the award of commutation.
- 6. An allowance in respect of a wife, child, or other person shall not be subject to commutation.
- 7. For the purposes of these Regulations, Great War pensions shall be calculated, in the case of soldiers and airmen, at the rates provided in the Royal Warrant for soldiers of the 17th April, 1918, and, in the case of seamen and marines, at the rates provided in the Order in Council of the 14th January, 1919,(a) with respect to the pensions of seamen and marines disabled or deceased in consequence of the Great War, and in each case with the addition of 20 per cent. of such rates.
- 8. The sum payable in lieu of the part of the pension which is commuted shall be calculated according to the Tables appended hereto.
